Ongoing threats to aviation security require that certain security measures be undertaken. The Supreme Court has held that administrative searches are reasonable to undertake without first obtaining search warrants. Airport checkpoint searches are administrative (or "special needs") searches. Several federal appellate courts have held that airport screening searches are reasonable, in that they appropriately balance the privacy interests of citizens against the compelling goal of protecting the traveling public. While all passengers must submit to an administrative search to gain access to an aircraft, TSA's policy is to afford passengers professional and courteous treatment with dignity and respect. Whole body imaging provides TSA with a means of detecting a wide variety of threats, including suicide vests and other Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) that are hidden under individuals' clothing and that may not be detected during metal-detection screening. TSA is sensitive to passengers' concerns about protecting their privacy as it relates to the security screening process, and in particular the use of whole body imaging technology. TSA has used whole body imaging on a purely voluntary basis as an alternative to a pat-down inspection. Passengers who have been identified for screening with whole body imaging may opt for a pat-down instead, if that is their preference. In addition to effectiveness and suitability assessments of the whole body imaging technology, TSA is examining operational issues associated with the technology, including efficiency, privacy considerations, training, safety of use, and perceptions by the traveling public. TSA has established rigorous controls to ensure privacy during whole body imaging screening. The Transportation Security Officer (TSO) attending the passenger will not view the image, while a second TSO will view the image in a separate, remote location and will not be able to view the passenger. No cameras, cellular telephones, or other devices capable of capturing an image are permitted in the image viewing area. The image cannot be stored, transmitted, or printed and is permanently deleted after each passenger has been screened. We have worked very hard to address privacy concerns while testing whole bo imaging technology. We believe that whole body imaging technology will be an effective tool in detecting terrorist threats. We look forward to continued public dialogue as we assess the effectiveness of the technology in the airport setting. We expressed that to the TSA officers, one whom said I didn't have to go through that machine and could go through the metal detector. We of course chose this option for me, feeling more comfortable with the traditional method. I was however completely surprised when after being okaved by the metal detector I was asked to wait in a roped off are for a female TSO to come and do a physical pat down. I was NOT told I would have to have that done. I was under the impression that pat downs were still considered a secondary security check option should the first provide a reason for concern. I found the entire process very violating, having this person place there hands on me. Neither option given to me (if you can call what I chose an option since I wasn't informed of what would happen should I choose not to go through the machines being tested at the airport) made me feel more secure flying, rather it made me feel that my privacy had been violated. I understand the desire of the TSA to provide the best possible security for passengers and airport personnel, however these new machines and the alternative security checks are a violation of my privacy. As a result of my experience I will chose airports who are not using these machines when traveling to visit out family in the future. My negative experience has caused me to reconsider the means of transportation I use when traveling. I hope the input from my experience is helpful as you "test" these machines in airports, and receive feedback from travelers. Also, when our boarding group was called to board the plane, once we had our ticket scanned we entered the jetway where my husband who was pulling out carryon (and had already gone through the MMW machine along with our bag going through the scanner) was required to have our carryon roller bag openned and searched right there in the jet way and had to present his ID again. This seemed ridiculous given that the bag had already been checked at the security check point and he had already shown his ID when being checked at the security check point as well. This of course delayed our boarding of the flight and was additionally frustrating since it was repetitive and unnecessary given the fact we had already gone through the security measures at the security check point and were cleared. Our entire security check experience was completely upsetting

Ongoing threats to aviation security require that certain security measures be undertaken. The Supreme Court has held that administrative searches are reasonable to undertake without first obtaining search warrants. Airport checkpoint searches are administrative (or "special needs") searches. Several federal appellate courts have held that airport screening searches are reasonable, in that they appropriately balance the privacy interests of citizens against the compelling goal of protecting the traveling public. While all passengers must submit to an administrative search to gain access to an aircraft, TSA's policy is to afford passengers professional and courteous treatment with dignity and respect. Whole body imaging provides TSA with a means of detecting a wide variety of threats, including suicide vests and other Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) that are hidden under individuals' clothing and that may not be detected during metal-detection screening. TSA is sensitive to passengers' concerns about protecting their privacy as it relates to the security screening process, and in particular the use of whole body imaging technology. To date, TSA has used whole body imaging on a purely voluntary basis as an alternative to a pat-down inspection. Passengers who have been identified for screening with whole body imaging may opt for a pat-down instead, if that is their preference. In addition to effectiveness and suitability assessments of the whole body imaging technology, TSA is examining operational issues associated with the technology, including efficiency, privacy considerations, training, safety of use, and perceptions by the traveling public. TSA has established rigorous controls to ensure privacy during whole body Imaging screening. The Transportation Security Officer (TSO) attending the passenger will not view the Image, while a second TSO will ylew the image in a separate, remote location and will not be able to view the passenger. No cameras, cellular telephones, or other devices capable of capturing an image are permitted in the image viewing area. The image cannot be stored, transmitted, or printed and is permanently deleted after each passenger has been screened. We have worked very hard to address privacy concerns while testing whole bo imaging technology. We believe that whole body imaging technology will be an effective tool in detecting terrorist threats. We look forward to continued public dialogue as we assess the effectiveness of the technology in the airport setting. often to Thailand, out of Los Angeles International Airport, I recently found that LAX initiated the use of Millimeter Wave scanners there sometime in 2008. On one of my trips, I was told to walk into what looked like a clear glass or hard plastic cubicle. Once inside, I was told to turn around and stand in place for a few seconds. When I had exited the cubicle at the security persons command, I asked her "what was that, and why did you have me do that"? She said "never mind, you can go". Now a

year or so later, I realize that was my first encounter with a body scanner. There were no signs at all on the device to advise passengers of what it was. And, the security person did not tell me what I had just been subjected to when I asked her about it. The TSA, (Transportation Security Administration), in the U.S. claims that there are now "clearly visible" signs on the scanners, so that people may opt for a more traditional security screening, if they desire. Dieling in a terrorist attack is something I would like to avoid, but I would much prefer to have a traditional security screening, even one that involves a 'pat down' or partial removal of my clothes.
